

FY19 Mission Impact Cheat Sheet

The Sprout School

- **95%** of children able to write their first name.
- **95%** of children able to create a simple AB pattern.
- **100%** of children able to sort by two math attributes.
- **100%** of children increased knowledge in social science & science.
- **100%** of children increased fine & gross motor skills.
- **100%** of rising kindergarteners were registered for kindergarten on time.
- **91%** of rising kindergarteners can recognize 11 or more uppercase letters.
- **93%** of rising kindergarteners can rhyme or identify rhymes.

Parent Survey Results:

- **95%** of parents reported having a good relationship with their child's teacher and other staff.
- **95%** of parents reported always feeling welcome, respected and valued by teachers and staff.
- **93%** of parents feel comfortable asking Sprout School staff for help navigating challenges around early childhood education and family life.

Sexual and Domestic Violence Services

- **3,119 hours:** the total amount of time our RHART program was supported by volunteers ready to immediately respond to the emergency departments of local hospitals. There they provided support and resources to survivors of intimate partner violence and sexual assault. 24/7 coverage of RHART response was also provided by staff. **Seventy-two percent** of those **386** survivors were interested in being contacted about follow-up services, such as counseling and case management, after they left the hospital.
- **3,906** hotline calls answered through the Greater Richmond Regional Hotline; **501** calls were the result of Richmond and VCU police officers conducting Lethality Assessment Protocol (LAP) when responding to intimate partner violence.
- **136** adults and children established new, violence-free homes through rapid rehousing.
- **124** survivors met with our Employment Navigator to work toward securing employment, or are working on job certifications or additional education.
- **536** survivors received legal advocacy including information and accompaniment on protective orders and criminal matters as well as criminal and civil advocacy. Our court advocate provided **417** of those survivors with on-site, trauma-informed crisis intervention when they arrived at the Richmond Juvenile and Domestic Relations District Court.
- **100%** of survivors reported that because of services received, they are more hopeful about their lives.

Outreach & Prevention

- **3,295** community members, including high school and college students, learned healthy relationship building and violence prevention strategies at **118** community outreach events and programs.
- **97%** of participants reported learning a new skill and/or resource they could use to promote healthy relationships and counteract factors that support violence.
- **98%** of outreach program participants reported an increased awareness in community resources that serve survivors and those affected by domestic and sexual violence.
- **27** Teen Peer Facilitators have completed the Empower RVA Teens training in the past 3 years.

Women's Leadership

- Our 39th annual Outstanding Women Awards had its most successful year to date in April. While celebrating accomplishments of nine outstanding women, we raised more than **\$180,000** for the programs and services we provide. This year we honored Jane Henderson, Susan Gooden, Sally Graham, Greta Harris, Susan Clarke Schaar, Katherine Wintsch, Christy Coleman, and Susan Adolf.
- The Pat Asch Fellowship for Social Justice is an annual award presented to one woman aged 50 or better to support her continued work or professional development to advance social justice in Greater Richmond. In its fifth year, the Pat Asch Fellowship and \$17,000 stipend was awarded to **Anne Moss Rogers** to advance her advocacy and education around preventing youth suicide.
- The Young Women's Leadership Alliance (YWLA) is YWCA Richmond's young women's professional board, with members between the ages of 25 to 35. YWLA connects, equips and inspires the next generation of woman leaders in Richmond. YWLA's Rising Outstanding Woman Award is an annual award recognizing an emerging leader who, through their own influence, passion and actions empower RVA. We presented this award in its third year to **Alexandra Hicks, founder of the Nerd Squad**, for her work empowering young minds through literacy.
